








Emergency Watershed Protection Program Update Construction planned for 2021

As many of you remember the spring of 2019 brought flood waters to the Middle Fork of Powder River. With the flood waters there was damage done to diversion structures and stream banks in the Middle Fork. The PRCD working with the NRCS applied for funding through the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program. Five projects where identified and the PRCD received funding to repair 3 diversions, 1 irrigation structure and complete some streambank stabilization on the Middle Fork of Powder River.

Along with the NRCS funding so far the PRCD has received grant funding from the Wyoming Natural Resource Foundation and the Wyoming Wildlife and Natural Resource Trust. Partners for these project include: NRCS, JC Commissioners, Town of Kaycee, Private Landowners, Wyoming Game and Fish Department, Wyoming Department of Transportation, Wyoming Natural Resource Foundation, Wyoming Wildlife and Natural Resource Trust, Trout Unlimited, and the Powder River Irrigation District.

The PRCD and the NRCS have spent the last year and a half working to get these projects designed and ready for construction. The challenges of COVID-19 has extended the construction of these project further out than the District would have liked, however, this upcoming spring-fall will see a considerable amount of projects constructed on the Middle Fork.



15 Mile EWP Project-This project will stabilize the 15 Mile irrigation overflow structure and the banks around the structure. This project will insure that the Sahara Ditch irrigators receive their irrigation water. Designs for this project should be finalized by the end of the year and the bid/contracting process will begin in January 2012.

Town of Kaycee/HJP EWP Project-This project will stabilizing the streambank from the Old HWY 87 Bridge on Nolan Avenue through the beginning the of the previous HJP EWP project. One cross vane will be installed and the 90 degree bend in the river will be widened to allow for improved water flow. Toe rock will be installed to stabilize the streambanks. This project is under contract and as soon as weather and stream conditions allow construction will begin.





Gosney/Moffet/Harlan Diversion EWP Projects-

These three projects will replace the traditional push up diversion structures with a cross vane structure, as well streambank stabilization measures and cross vanes will be installed down stream. At this time 60% designs have been completed and the PRCD hopes to have final designs early next year and be under contract for construction by June of 2021. Permitting for

these projects has begun and the district continues to look for grant funding to help off set the cost of the projects not covered by the NRCS. We look forward to seeing these improvements installed in Southern Johnson County.

Western Spruce Budworm Thinning Project Summer/Fall 2021


The southern end of the Big Horn Mountains Douglas Fir population is currently being devastated by a Western Spruce Budworm epidemic. The Western Spruce Budworm (WSBW), or *Choristoneura freeman* is a native species to the Big Horns, and as such, it is not the objective of the Powder River Conservation District's Forest Health Program to eliminate the species, but rather to decrease the population to levels that are less

damaging. Currently 67,000 acres of Douglas Fir and mixedconifer forest are infected by the WSBW and causing major defoliation damage in the southern Big Horn Mountains.

The Powder River Conservation District has begun to implement a program that:

- 1. Provides a proactive forest health thinning component for private and state lands
- Viably treats WSB infected Douglas fir and mixedconifer forested areas through mechanized thinning
- 3. Capitalizes on a large-scale, multi-landowner project.

Phase 1 of this landscape level active management will be to thin approximately 444 acres on state and private acres. The PRCD will work with the WSFD to thin thick stands of Douglas Fir and mixed-conifer stands of multiple age groups which will help decrease WSBW infestation rates. Technical assistance from WSFD will help determine which trees are suited for wood production, are important for wildlife habitat, and will facilitate successful regeneration. This project will benefit state and private lands and will build lasting relationships for the continuum of active forest management in this area of the Big Horn Mountains.



The PRCD has secured WSF grant funding to complete this project during the summer/fall of 2021. A contractor has been selected and as soon as weather and ground conditions allow they will begin the thinning projects. The PRCD is extremely excited to take on this new project and venture into improving a natural resource we had previously not worked on.
